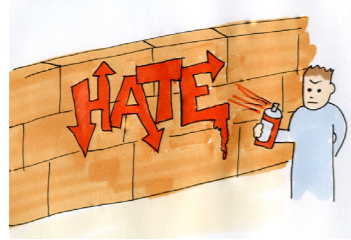

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

What is Hate Crime?

Scots Law defines a Hate Crime as a crime committed against a person or property that is motivated by 'malice or ill-will towards an identifiable social group'.



If you have been the victim of a crime and you believe you have been targeted because of the perception that you belong to one of the 'social groups' listed below, then it is likely you have been the victim of a Hate Crime.



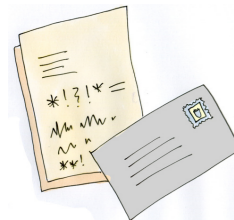
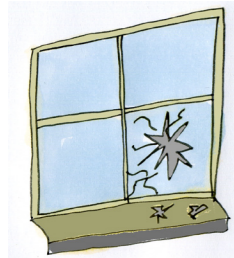
The 'social groups', or categories, to which the term 'Hate Crime' can be applied in the Courts are:

- race
- religion
- sexual orientation
- transgender identity
- disability



Hate Crime can take a number of forms, including, but not limited to:

- physical assault
- criminal damage to property eg. graffiti, arson, vandalism
- intimidating or threatening behaviour including obscene calls or gestures
- offensive literature such as letters, leaflets, posters
- verbal abuse or insults including name-calling or offensive 'jokes'



- emotional and psychological abuse
- bullying
- murder

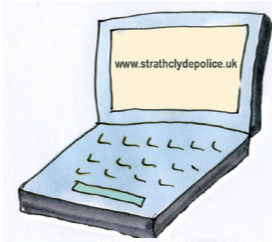


What to do if you experience or witness a 'Hate Crime' incident:

If you experience or witness a Hate Crime incident, no matter how trivial or unimportant you may think it is, your complaint will be taken seriously. Report the incident to the police -



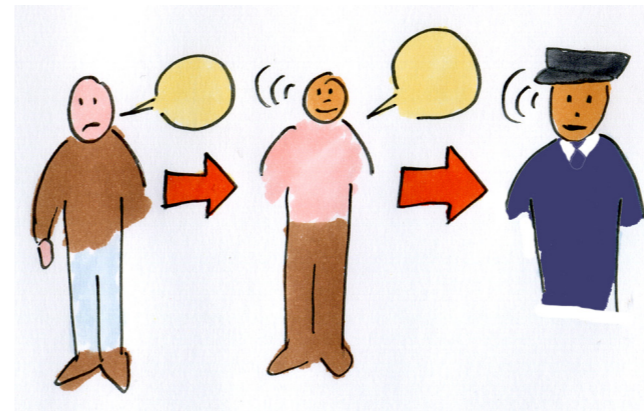
- in person, by telephone or letter
- through the on-line crime reporting facility available on Strathclyde Police website.
- through a Third Party Reporting Centre*



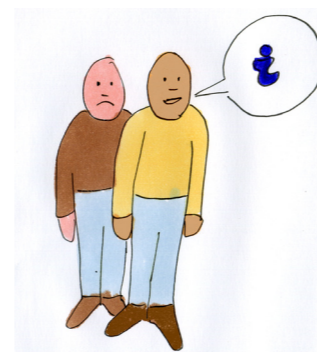
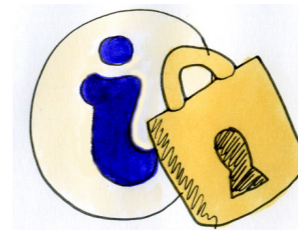

What is Third Party Reporting?

Many people, for various reasons, are reluctant to report crime directly to the police. Third party reporting is an important way to overcome this. Third Party Reporting Centres are agencies which have agreed to take on the role of third party reporting in addition to the services which they normally provide.



Reports of hate crime can be made, by victims and/or witnesses, to any third party reporting centre in Glasgow. They will pass the information to the police on your behalf only with your consent. The police are then required to act on this as if they had received the report directly from you. Your report will be in



confidence and you can give as much or as little personal information as you wish. These centres have received appropriate training and can also provide you with any additional support or advice required.

To locate a Third Party Reporting Centre near you, or one which is particularly relevant to your concerns, please see the reverse side of this leaflet.

How do I report to the police online?

Sometimes people feel sufficiently confident to report directly to the police but may not want to go to a police office or have a police officer visit them. The

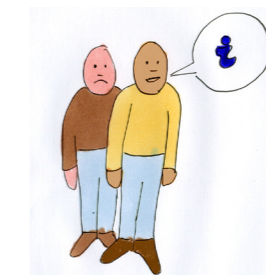


on-line crime reporting facility allows you to make a direct and confidential report to the police. The report can be entirely anonymous if you wish, although this may make police investigation more difficult.

Why report a Hate Crime?

There are a number of reasons why reporting Hate Crime is important:



- if you are a victim you can receive appropriate support and advice
- you will help the police to build a picture of the nature and extent of Hate Crime in your community and in Glasgow
- you will help to raise awareness of the issue and lead to a change in attitudes
- your information could lead to an arrest and conviction
